Lifecycle of continuum of African American Disparities


Prenatal Breastfeeding

Breastfeeding offers protective factors along the lifecycle






Slavery Impacted Breastfeeding and Children's Health

- Wet Nurses




Historical Barriers All US Populations


- POLICIES Limited maternity leave, WIC 1986 free formula vouchers
- HOSPITALS AND HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS Interference and misinformation
- WORKPLACE Lack of support/access to pump at work
- COMMUNITY Lack of support to breastfeed in public
- PERSONAL SELF EFFICACY Lack of exposure to successful breastfeeding mothers

- Father and Mother live apart

Father Support

- Referral For Other Services
- stress, employment, education housing, health concerns, child support, legal consultation, parenting, goal-setting, etc.
- Bond with the other fathers in sessions
- Men do not feel as "substitute parents"



Father Support Follow-up

Follow-up:

- Collect Registration and Surveys
- Follow-up Phone Calls Monthly.
- Address concerns
- > Breastfeeding Peer Notifies Father Peer Advocate when baby is born

Dads are Needed for Breastfeeding



Game Plan:

 Group leader asks the question
 Client rolls die – whatever number lands on top (up to 4) is the number of responses he must provide to answer the question.

Fathers:

Tell me (1,2,3,4,) things you can do to be involved in breastfeeding choices.

- Attend the WIC class and appointments with the mother of my child.
- Attend prenatal visits (and bring up infant feeding).
- Share what I know about breastfeeding choices.
- Ask her what she thinks about breastfeeding and what she wants to know about.

Fathers:

Tell me (1,2,3,4) things you can do to support the mother of your baby with breastfeed

- Unwrap the mother and the baby to breastfeed.
- Help position the baby to her breast-she only has two hands.
- Bring the baby to her in the night and day to feed.
- Put the baby "back to sleep" in the crib/bassinette/Pac-N-Play when done feeding.

Fathers:

Tell me (1,2,3.4) things some fathers might not like about breastfeeding.

- "I don't want her breasts out there for everyone to see."
- "Breastfeeding messes up women's breast."
- "It's weird to have a baby suck on your breast."

Mothers:

Tell me (1,2,3,4) things you can do to include your baby father in infant feeding

- Invite him to your WIC class and appointments.
- Invite him to prenatal visits (and bring up infant feeding.
- Share what you know about breastfeeding benefits.
- Ask him what he thinks about breastfeeding and what he wants to know about it.







 Attend fatherhood program




6 MONTH Survey Results
